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UNEXPECTED JOURNEY

I saw a small pine needle basket at a friend's studio. I asked her to show me how to weave; that was my start. A very slow process. I went to my brother's woodpile and found a log with bark. I cut the log then drilled holes, and wove a basket. Still too slow. I decided to become a wood turner and so it went from there.

My inspiration for the Big Leaf Maple piece came from the shape and texture. The uniqueness and beauty of the wood has evolved creating "Unexpected Journey" with Wood and Weaving.

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MAPLE BARLEY TWIST

As an artist/designer woodturner, I enjoy exploring my creative ideas to produce pieces the wood craft allows. This piece is made with solid figured maple, turned and carved to create a twisted barley rim. I saw some walking canes carved with a barley twist. I took the basic idea and developed into a turned carved art piece.

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MAPLE WEAVED PLATTER

My inspiration for this double sided turned solid maple platter was to carve a weaved pattern around a bowl. The project started then was put on hold for a year as the carving time required was too labour intensive. I returned to complete the project the following winter. This is my original design.

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Carved Green Vessel

Carved Vessel - was turned, carved and painted. As the birch piece was turned - I noticed an area of the vessel with non-solid punky grain. This large defective wood area was used as a design opportunity to carve out the poor wood resulting in an odd shape. The top of the vessel was then cut on an angle to provide a unique composition.

This crib was built for my first child and wasn't finished until he was 7 months old. The design was inspired by one that YouTuber Matt Cremona built. If you look carefully, you can see a couple of small tooth marks on the front rail where our son Declan was testing his new teeth. I'm quite pleased with how well the crib has weathered so far in use. It has seen its fair share of spills, tumbles and bonks! This gives me hope that it might survive to be used for my grandchildren some day. A heartwarming note is that many nights when I read my son stories before bed, he asks to see the video of me cutting the grooves for the rear panel with a router plane and says "Daddy make Declan's crib?".

This piece of wood was almost left behind. I felled a standing-dead Manitoba Maple at a farm near Didsbury and there were about 8 inches of stump left. This bowl was made from one half of that stump. The shape of the blank led to the winged shape of the bowl.

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SIMPLE WALL SHELF

We needed some shelving in our Ensuite bathroom to keep items out of the reach of a toddler. My wife wanted to buy a cheap IKEA shelf, but I said "no way" and insisted I spend a month constructing a simple set of shelves. The design was modified from a shelf that I had seen years ago in a YouTube video by Marc Spagnuolo (The Wood Whisperer). I modified the design to lighten the look and "weight" of the shelves. I also included a hidden cleat mounting system so that it would support weight better and still have no visible fasteners.

The Cherry and Movingui (Nigerian Satinwood) did not look very good together,but when I separated them with some ebony everything fell into place. This was a challenging piece to build with lots of drawing and redrawing during the design phase, to nail down the overall form and get the details right.

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Z LOUNGE CHAIR

This mid-century modern lounge chair features clean, sweeping lines and high-quality mortise and tenon joinery. It is inspired by the design of Poul Jensen for Selig (circa 1950's Denmark). It is crafted from black walnut, and has been hand shaped and finished to showcase the unique characteristics of the wood. The chair features a deep charcoal cushioned seat and backrest made from premium low-sheen, full grain aniline leather. The maker has a strong technical and engineering background, as well as an appreciation for quality, and was inspired to bring together wood and leatherwork mediums to create a unique, long-lasting piece.

A wood lathe is my favourite tool and can be used to create some beautiful things. When you get the chance to explore what mother nature disguises as old weathered lumps of wood and expose what lies beneath things often get very interesting. This little piece is an example of just that.

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A Lidded Cedar Bowl

Sometimes you come across something special, and in this case the surprise was hidden within. This particular burl is one of the most spectacular I have seen and hopefully I have done it justice.

It has been my experience that this type of wood is often full of voids and bark inclusions, but on the interior it was perfect. I tried to keep some of the natural burl edges on the outside to contrast with the smooth turned wood. This way you can see and feel a small part of what the tree looked like.

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Borderline Bench

The BORDERLINE BENCH features a unique design aesthetic creating a stepped boundary line between a finely polished hardwood surface and the antiqued milk painted shell. This feature requires technical expertise to seamlessly blend joints prior to assembly. The bench is constructed with mortise and tenon joints throughout. The bench top has cutouts that allow the legs to rise up through the seat and add interest to the design. It was oiled with several coats of finish burnished to a high sheen.

TALL STOOL

TALL STOOL features a hollowed out seat in Cherry and sculpted legs in Ash. The stool features mortise and tenon joinery into the seat at the top of the legs and also where the stretchers meet the legs. The joinery is a type of cogged shouldered joint for the "x" stretcher connection. Ones own legs wrap around the legs of the stool in a manner found comfortable to the sitter to use the "x" cross members as feet rest. The seat has been shaped with traditional bottoming tools (Scorp and Travisher) to create a gentle hollow that offers a more comfortable sitting experience. The finish is several coats of oil hand rubbed in to a beautiful sheen.

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CHERRY MIRROR

The MIRROR shown in Cherry features bridle joints throughout the framed construction. The glass slides down into the frame in dadoes that secure the mirror within the frame. The top rail of the frame comes off by retracting two top screws from the back and lifting off the top rail. This aids in glass replacement should an issue arise. The mirror secures to the wall with a cleat system commonly found in furniture making. Featured on this piece is the 3/4" rounds that I use regularly to soften edges and create a sensual aesthetic that aims to invite one to touch and feel the piece.

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REFLEXION

This piece is a continuum of a series of pieces that use a curving flute design on the pieces. The flutes are then carved, textured or burned to provide a surface that feels alive and touchable. This piece was painted a solid blue color and then dry brushed with acrylic/copper to highlight the texture and pattern. This piece is figured Maple.

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Burl With Bark

This Russian Olive hollow form was turned to incorporate the bark into the body of the piece. This technique can be successful or unsuccessful depending on the integrity of the bark and the steadiness of the turners hand on the tool. I enjoy the process of turning hollow forms and the technical skill required to create the thinnest walls possible in each piece.

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Convergence

My enjoyment in making hollow forms continues with this piece of Manitoba Maple Burl. These pieces are often a gamble as bark inclusions are common and can cause the pieces to be unusable or needing to be cut into smaller pieces. This piece caused me some consternation as it had three fairly large bark inclusions which needed to be dealt with. By filling the inclusions with colored epoxy and thinning the vessel a light can be shone into the top hole and the epoxy glows.

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FLYING SAUCER TABLE

This piece started with a single Mahogany board and was turned into a tray three years prior. It evolved into a table based on a need for a side table in our home. The base consists of bent laminations of Sapele and Douglas Fir edge banding. The floating top and complementary turned mahogany finial provide some visual interest.

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Spatled Birch & Walnut Box

Spalting is any form of wood coloration caused by fungi. In this case the coloration is black, brown and light blue, which greatly enhances the look of the finished box. This wood is rejected flooring, rescued from a dumpster. I use a wood hinge for almost all my boxes now, it provides a cohesiveness form a materials standpoint and often generates questions.

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CHERRY SERVING TRAY W/ LOUIS CUBE INLAY

I have been fascinated with the beauty of marquetry for some time and have used it sparingly on a few projects in the past. When planning the serving tray the bottom seemed like a perfect canvas to fill with a large marquetry design. Louis cubes are named for King Louis XIV of France because the cubes were popular on furniture during his reign, but the cubes go back much further in antiquity. I chose to use them to provide visual interest to an otherwise mundane household object.

I purchased a block of spalted beech because I liked it. The block dictated the size of the vessel and the shape that was turned on a wood-lathe. I wanted to see how small an opening I could use to hollow out the vessel. It is finished with Wipe-On Poly.

I saw a negative spaced wine bottle years ago done online using a wood-lathe and it inspired my interest. A box of mystery wood was gifted to me from my brother-in-law. The wash-basin is recycled maple stamp blocks and walnut scraps along with unknown wood, finished with Wipe-On Poly.

I was so intrigued by the odd clump of trees that I tried to duplicate what I saw. The green is wood dye and the marks are wood-burned and finished with Wipe-On Poly.


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NEIL DORIN Study in Serenity

The making of this piece was more about learning new techniques than making something unique. I had long wanted to attempt a kumiko piece, and after getting a book by Desmond King about the Japanese art of Kumiko and Shoji, I was inspired to use the traditional techniques from his book to build an Andon lamp with Kumiko panels. The design of the pattern on the panels was inspired by photos of a lamp on Desmond King's website. Because of the small scale and size of the pieces in this project (totalling 351 individual pieces), it was a test of my skills with hand tools. I have long been influenced by the Japanese philosophy of Wabi-Sabi and so intentionally left one of the nail holes from the original reclaimed board visible at the top of one of the legs.

Doug Drury Amaryllis Vase

In keeping with previous years, I wanted to make a segmented piece for the 2 X 4 challenge, but this year add some color. The vase consists of 241 pieces of spruce from a single economy stud from Home Depot. The picture of the Amaryllis was wood burned into the vase after turning and then colored with an airbrush. Top finish is spray lacquer.

Inspired by a Rob Cosman jewelry chest but I wanted to incorporate Kumiko into the doors as a decorative detail. The constraints of the 2x4 challenge resulted in using a wood that is too soft for daily use. Awarded Second Place in the 2018 Calgary Stampede Showcase Functional Handmade Art category.

I made a walnut tray a few years ago for our family room coffee table and this piece was inspired by that tray but scaled down to work with the material limitations of a single 8 foot 2x4. I purposely chose the 2x4 for its color variations for visual interest.

WILF TALBOT Inspiration

A photo, posted on the Segmented Wood turners' website in Dec 2018 of "Spherical Journey" created by Malcolm Tibbits was the impetus for my SAWS 2X4 contest entry. The ribbon form is composed from eight, sixteen segment open bottom bowls. One quarter of each bowl was removed leaving a total of 96 compound miter segments glued together creating the final form. The precision required to cut each of the segments inspired me to reach a new level of accuracy with my work to achieve the desired results.
